Brown, manager of the E Boston Athletic association, asking him why he did not fill out the entry 1 t 1 blanks, also asking if it meant that 1 he would not compete in the Boston games. Mr. Brown continued by say-8 ing that Drew was running in New 3' t York every week, but that every efe fort to have him compete in the B. A. A. had failed. He asked what the 11 11 trouble was. Drew said last night that he answered him by saying that he had 8 p nothing against the fellows down there, for they had always given him n the best possible treatment upon every occasion he had anything to do with them, But he recalled that there n is a notice posted on a bulletin board in the club which says that no negro e shall ever represent it in any way. n Drew said last night: "As long as đ the B. A. A. has this rule I shall đ never appear there. The club states ٠specifically that it does not want ne-0 groes and under the conditions I think e it would be foolish for me to ap-0 pear there as, a money-making at-8 traction for them. I find enough races 7 to take up my time without entering any of the B. A.
